




# CHICKASAW FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIP RECEPTION

# INCHOKKAALAALI (I'M VISITING) ASSISTANCE REQUEST REPORT

Through the Inchokkaalaali (I'm Visiting) Assistance Request Program, Chickasaw Foundation offers Oklahoma schools an educational, hands-on field trip to the Chickasaw Cultural Center in Sulphur, OK. This opportunity provides students and faculty a fun and educational day learning about Chickasaw history and culture.

Funding for this program is provided in part by a grant the Chickasaw Foundation received from Oklahoma Humanities (OH) and the National Endowment of Humanities (NEH). The Oklahoma City Community Foundation also awarded a grant to the Chickasaw Foundation to fund school groups from central Oklahoma. Through these grants—in addition to covering admission fees, sack lunches and fuel reimbursement—we were able to include horticultural or cultural art craft demonstration kits for students to use after the field trip to reinforce what they learned.

Forty-one Oklahoma schools visited the Chickasaw Cultural Center in 2023 with an additional 18 being approved to attend, totaling nearly 2,000 students and faculty.

"Many of my students are not in a situation in which they get to experience fun, educational, and culturally diverse environments," a faculty member of Ardmore Public Schools explained. "I believe this was a positive, and memorable trip for my students."

# SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENT HEADED TO MEDICIAL SCHOOL

ducation is exorbitantly expensive," said Reese Siegle, a Chickasaw Foundation scholarship recipient. "But through scholarships like the Lillian Fowler Memorial Scholarship, I was able to significantly relieve the financial burden that comes with studying medicine."



Siegle is currently a medical student at the University of North Dakota School of Medicine and Health Sciences. His plan is to eventually practice medicine and give back to the community he grew up in. "I am a product of a public health service physician dad and Indian health service nurse mom," he noted, "both of their experiences in medicine have inspired me to pursue a career serving American Indian patients. I am presently attending medical school at the University of North Dakota School of Medicine and Health Sciences through the Indians into Medicine Program, and I plan to one day come back and serve Chickasaw Nation as a Medical Doctor."

Reese was astonished to learn he received the Lillian Fowler Memorial Scholarship. "It was at my white coat ceremony that I received the

letter stating I had been the recipient of the Lillian Fowler Memorial Scholarship," he mentioned. "My nana, Sharon Leming, was ecstatic. She explained to me that Lillian Fowler had attended boarding school with my granny. Their friendship continued through adulthood when my granny would go to the senior site in Pauls Valley to cook."

Siegle explained further: "Nana told me that Granny and Lillian spent lots of time laughing and telling stories together and that they were 'pretty big buds.' [She also] told me how happy my Granny would be knowing I had received a scholarship honoring her good friend. For me, receiving the Lillian Fowler Memorial Scholarship means honoring Lillian Fowler and my granny Rosalie Imotichey.

Reese credits the help of the Chickasaw Nation and Chickasaw Foundation for his road through education. "My path to medicine looks a little different than many people. I graduated my undergraduate school in three years and immediately matriculated into medical school," he said. "A family member once told me 'You only attended elementary, junior high, high school and college because you had to [in order to] go to medical school.' In other words, the highest priority goal for me is becoming a doctor by attending medical school. Without the financial help of Chickasaw Nation, I never would have been able to devote as much of my time to my studies or take as many credit hours as I did and graduate early."

Chickasaw Foundation congratulates Reese on his educational success and wishes him the best in his studies!


# COMMUNITIES FOUNDATION OF OKLAHOMA



This initiative is led by the Chickasaw Nation's Division of Public Health and pediatric clinics to support the tribal youth literacy project.
